The Mayor's Community Budget Day Presentation

During the Mayor's Community Budget Day presentation, the Mayor will introduce his budget priorities and provide indepth information about the state of the City's Budget. Ensuring the Effectiveness and Success of Your NC's 2010 Election

The City Clerk's staff will host a roundtable discussion with Neighborhood Council stakeholders and board members to discuss their expectations for the 2010 Neighborhood Council Elections. The discussion will begin with a quick overview of the 2008 Elections, including what was implemented and what was learned. Participants will be invited to into a dialogue on the election process and proposed options for the implementation of the 2010 elections.

The LA Full Public Funding Project and LA's Neighborhood Councils

The Los Angeles City Council and Department of Neighborhood Empowerment (DONE) formally initiated the LA Full Public Funding Education and Feedback Project last winter in order to hear from Neighborhood Council members and stakeholders citywide about the idea of establishing a system of Full Public Funding for electoral campaigns in LA. This workshop will begin with a brief discussion with several neighborhood councils who have organized Full Public Funding workshops and then engage Congress attendees in an abbreviated Full Public Funding workshop. The goal is to enable participants to learn about and give feedback on this important policy issue and have input before the development of a specific policy. This is a unique opportunity for L.A.'s neighborhood councils to have a direct voice in creating city policy. This will also be an opportunity for neighborhood council members to see if they would like to host a Full Public Funding workshop with their own neighborhood councils.

The Council File Management System is an incredible new tool that provides almost instant results on the status of City legislation. Take advantage of this opportunity to understand what the Council File Management System has to offer and how to access it with a few clicks of your computer mouse. Also, in this workshop, you will learn how to write and submit a Community Impact Statement (CIS) and create a CIS process for your NC in order to ensure that your NC's opinions are registered in the agendas of City Council and other City decision-making entities.

NC Alliances Can Make a Real Difference for Your Community and Your Region Session 1: The "How To" of Creating Alliances.

Powerful alliances among Neighborhood Councils are forming across Los Angeles. One of the first alliances to get out of the gate was the Valley Alliance of Neighborhood Councils, which has become a major voice for Valley issues. Recently, West Area Neighborhood Councils joined together to form the Westside Regional Alliance; and NC representatives are also banding together in alliances that are focused on specific issues, such as Plan CheckLA. This forum provides a great opportunity for you find out more about these alliances and how you can become involved. In this Session, members of already existing alliances will share information about the evolution of their groups, some of the challenges they've faced and some of the things they might have done differently during the development stages of their group's history.

Open Forum with City Council Members

In this forum, you are invited to become better acquainted with City Council Members, You will be able to engage Council Members in dialogues about major issues facing the City, discuss City Councilmember's opinions on the laws and regulations that affect Neighborhood Councils, and find out about potential partnership or resource opportunities with City Council offices.

Open Forum with DWP's General Manager David Nahai

DWP General Manager David Nahai is bringing about change at the DWP. In this open forum, you will learn about how the DWP intends to handle major issues related to water and energy conservation, and how recycled sources of water and renewable energy options will play a role in our City's future. This is your opportunity to know what the Mayor's twenty-year water supply plan is and how it will affect all of us.

Open Forum with the Board of Neighborhood Commissioners, DONE's General Manager, and Representatives of the City Attorney's Office.

This is an opportunity to meet, greet and influence Board of Neighborhood Commission representatives, BongHwan Kim, the new General Manager of the Department of Neighborhood Empowerment; and Gwen Poindexter of the City Attorney's Neighborhood Council Advice Division. In this session you will learn more about the Board of Neighborhood Commissioners and its role in creating NC policy, rules and regulations. You will also hear about DONE's processes in identifying and acting on new NC priorities and how the City Attorney works with Neighborhood Councils on policy, legal and ethics issues. During this session, there will be a Board of Neighborhood Commissioners hearing on Conflict of Interest forms 52 and 53, which would affect all NC's.
